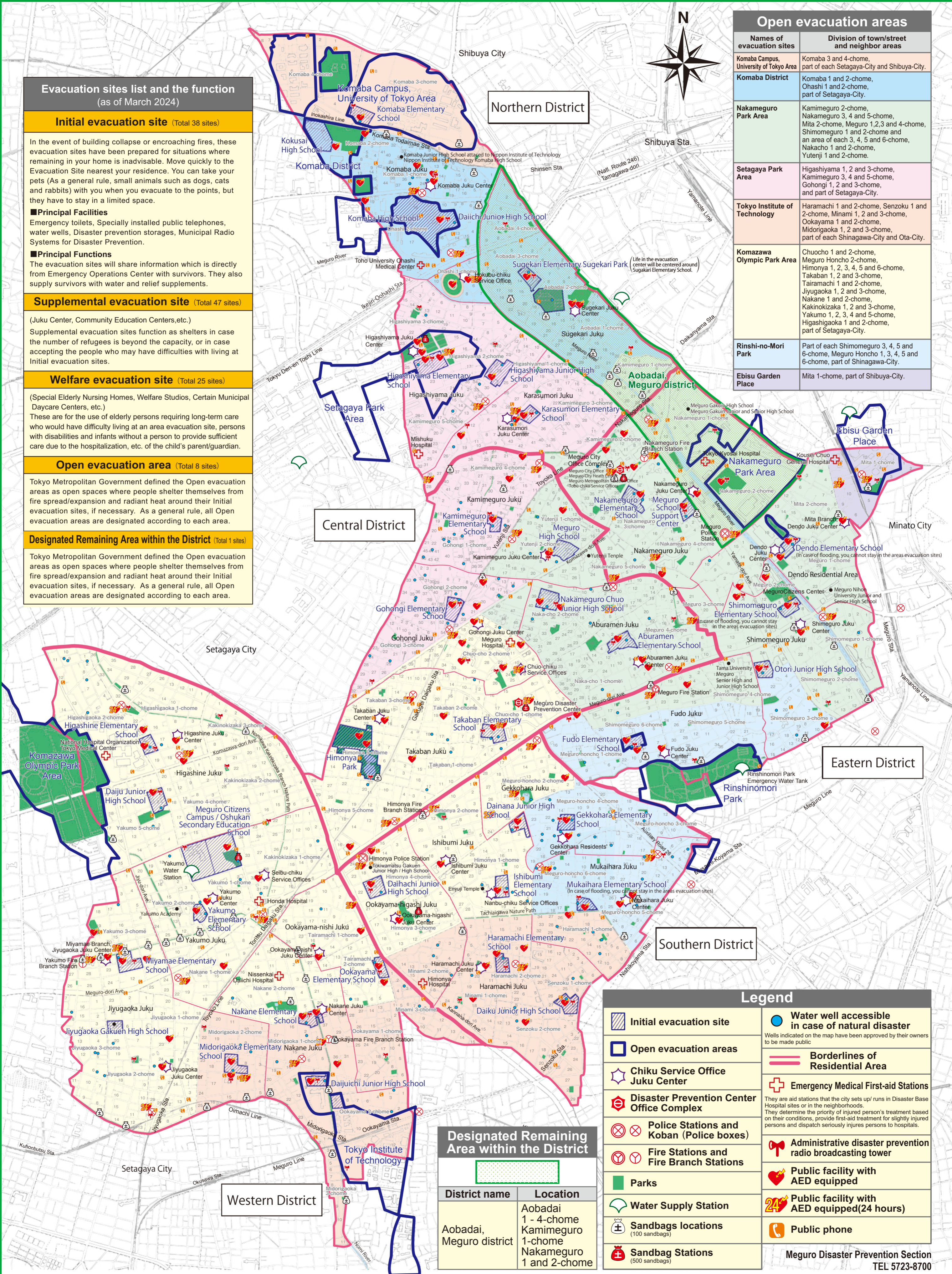


# Disaster Survival Map

| Evacuation sites list and the function (as of March 2024)            |  |

| <b>Initial evacuation site</b> (Total 38 sites)                      | In the event of building collapse or encroaching fires, these evacuation sites have been prepared for situations where remaining in your home is inadvisable. Move quickly to the Evacuation Site nearest your residence. You can take your pets (As a general rule, small animals such as dogs, cats and rabbits) with you when you evacuate to the points, but they have to stay in a limited space. |
| <b>Supplemental evacuation site</b> (Total 47 sites)                 | (Juku Center, Community Education Centers, etc.) Supplemental evacuation sites function as shelters in case the number of refugees is beyond the capacity, or in case accepting the people who may have difficulties with living at Initial evacuation sites.  |
| <b>Welfare evacuation site</b> (Total 25 sites)                      | (Special Elderly Nursing Homes, Welfare Studios, Certain Municipal Daycare Centers, etc.) These are for the use of elderly persons requiring long-term care who would have difficulty living at an area evacuation site, persons with disabilities and infants without a person to provide sufficient care due to the hospitalization, etc. of the child's parent/guardian.                            |
| <b>Open evacuation area</b> (Total 8 sites)                          | Tokyo Metropolitan Government defined the Open evacuation areas as open spaces where people shelter themselves from fire spread/expansion and radiant heat around their Initial evacuation sites, if necessary. As a general rule, all Open evacuation areas are designated according to each area.  |
| <b>Designated Remaining Area within the District</b> (Total 1 sites) | Tokyo Metropolitan Government defined the Open evacuation areas as open spaces where people shelter themselves from fire spread/expansion and radiant heat around their Initial evacuation sites, if necessary. As a general rule, all Open evacuation areas are designated according to each area.  |

| Setagaya Park Area                      | Higashiyama 1, 2 and 3-chome, Kamimeguro 3, 4 and 5-chome, Gohongi 1, 2 and 3-chome, and part of Setagaya-City.   |
| Tokyo Institute of Technology           | Haramachi 1 and 2-chome, Senzoku 1 and 2-chome, Minami 1, 2 and 3-chome, Ookayama 1 and 2-chome, Midorigaoka 1, 2 and 3-chome, part of each Shinagawa-City and Ota-City.  |
| Komazawa Olympic Park Area              | Chuocho 1 and 2-chome, Meguro Honcho 2-chome, Himonya 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6-chome, Takaban 1, 2 and 3-chome, Tairamachi 1 and 2-chome, Jiyugaoka 1, 2 and 3-chome, Nakane 1 and 2-chome, Kakinokizaka 1, 2 and 3-chome, Yakumo 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5-chome, Higashigaoka 1 and 2-chome, part of Setagaya-City. |
| Rinshi-no-Mori Park                     | Part of each Shimomeguro 3, 4, 5 and 6-chome, Meguro Honcho 1, 3, 4, 5 and 6-chome, part of Shinagawa-City.   |
| Ebisu Garden Place                      | Mita 1-chome, part of Shibuya-City.   |
